SCHOLARSHIPS

ASF awarded \$540,363 in 2026

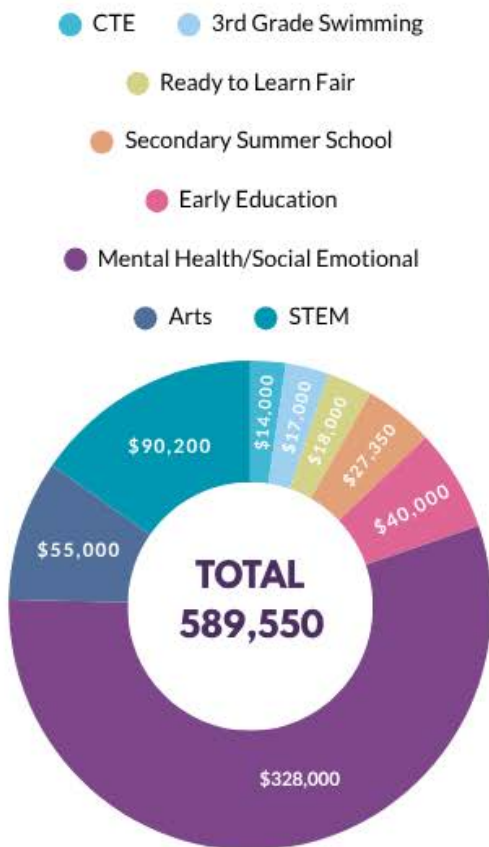
Scholarship awards are made using both passthrough and endowed funds. Endowed funds are invested for long-term growth while providing income to fund scholarships. The ASF Finance Committee monitors accounts and has set an investment policy target of 7.5% average annual return.

A professional investment company manages the endowment, and funds available may vary from year to year, depending on investment performance. The ASF endowment is currently at \$4.6 million. The majority of these funds are restricted to scholarship use.
